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1. INTRODUCTION¹

The Suriname Survey of Living Conditions (SSLC) 2022 is an effort of the Inter-American Development Bank (IDB) designed to support evidence-based policymaking and is the second round following the SSLC implemented in 2016-2017. It covers the same thematic areas as the SSLC 2016/17, such as education, health, housing, employment and poverty alleviation and incorporates new topics such as mental health, information and communication technologies (ICT), food insecurity and resilience to shocks. As in 2016-2017, it also collected data on consumption patterns, income and expenditures to support poverty analysis in Suriname.

It was implemented between January and December 2022 and interviewed about 2,500 households and 7,500 persons with national coverage. One thousand are panel households already interviewed in 2016-2017; the rest are new households selected for this round.

The SSLC 2022 was designed by Sistemas Integrales Consulting, and its fieldwork was carried out by DataFruit, a local survey firm, with the steering and technical direction of Sistemas Integrales Consulting. This report describes the main methodological aspects, such as sample design, estimation procedures, topics covered in the questionnaire, the structure of the resulting datasets and the quality control processes. Finally, the annexes present a technical note on the sampling weights calculation, a guide to the computation of estimates and sampling errors, the SSLC 2022 questionnaire, and a codebook of the datasets.

2. SAMPLE DESIGN

The SSLC 2022 target population includes all persons living in households throughout the full Suriname territory. Following the conventional practice for population surveys, it excludes the institutionalized population (i.e., persons living in prisons, nursing homes, long-term or dependent care facilities, long-term mining camps or military camps). According to the 2012 Population and Housing Census, Suriname had a household population of 534,932 persons living in 140,367 households.

It interviewed about 2,500 households and about 7,500 persons. Since one of SSLC's main objectives is to measure the consumption and expenditure patterns of the Surinamese population, the sample was evenly distributed over 12 months, from January through December 2022. The overall yearly sample was randomly allocated into 12 smaller monthly samples called replicates. Each replicate spreads across the entire country territory and is nationally representative. Thus, the overall SSLC sample is attained by aggregating the 12 monthly replicates, achieving both spatial and time representativeness and capturing consumption seasonality.

The SSLC 2022 sample design is based on the SSLC 2016/17 design, using the same strata and definition of Primary Sampling Units (PSUs). The 2022 sample included all 2016-2017 PSUs and households plus a supplement sample of new PSUs and households to compensate for attrition nonresponse and to reach a target of 2,500 respondent households.

Contrary to the usual practice in other Caribbean countries and other regions, the General Bureau of Statistics of Suriname did not give access to the latest Population Census data at the enumeration area level, which is usually used to inform household sample designs. However, the survey managed to replace this source of information with the national electric network database as a sampling frame.




Figure 1. EBS Connection Areas and Suriname Districts

The EnergieBedrijvan Suriname (EBS), which is the only power provider in Suriname and supplies the largest part of the national territory, granted access to its updated customer database to be used as a complete household sampling frame in the network-covered areas. The electric network is organized into 27 Connection Areas (CAs) that cover all districts except for parts of Brokopondo and Sipaliwini (Figure 1).

The areas not covered by the EBS network (the southern half of Brokopondo, the largest part of Sipaliwini, and small portions of a few other districts) are supplied by the Ministry of Natural Resources, which provides the small villages located in these areas with electrical generators and fuel. The Ministry of Natural Resources does not keep a record of the households served in these areas, so the only available sampling frame was the list of the villages located therein.

Given the survey's analytical objectives and the data available, the Suriname population was split into three geographic estimation domains:





Figure 2. Detailed View of EBS Connection Areas in the Great Paramaribo Domain

- 1. **Great Paramaribo**: Thirteen EBS CAs covering Paramaribo district and its peripheries (Figure 2). This domain includes Paramaribo's population plus part of the population in contiguous districts (Wanica, Saramacca and Commewijne) whose inhabitants generally commute to Paramaribo daily. It has the largest population and the highest density by far and may be broken down into two subdomains: *Paramaribo* and *Paramaribo* outskirts.
- 2. **Rest of the Coastal Region**: The remaining 14 EBS CAs on the coast that is, the coast excluding Great Paramaribo (Figure 3).
- 3. Interior: The territory not covered by the EBS electrical network and supplied by the Ministry of Natural Resources instead. This domain's population resides in 137 small villages located in most of Sipaliwini, the southern half of Brokopondo and small portions of other districts. Although it covers a much larger territory than the other two domains, it is the smallest in population.

Different sampling strategies were implemented in the Great Paramaribo and Rest of the Coastal Region domains versus the Interior domain.

In *domains Paramaribo* and *Rest of the Coastal Region*, where the EBS coverage is complete, the sampling frame was based on the up-to-date EBS customer database. The sample has a two-stage design stratified by CAs. In the first sampling stage, streets or groups of small streets operated as primary sampling units (PSUs) and a sample of PSUs was selected in each of the 27 CAs with probabilities proportionate to their size (PPS), using the number of households on each street as a measure of size.

The 2022 sample includes the 155 PSUs in domain Great Paramaribo and the 46 PSUs in domain Rest of the Coastal Region from the 2016-2017 sample, plus 183 new additional PSUs in Great Paramaribo and 52 new PSUs in the Coastal Region.




Figure 4. SSLC Sample PSUs (overall sample)




Figure 5. SSLC Sample PSUs in Domain Great Paramaribo

In line with the high concentration of Suriname population in Paramaribo and its outskirts, the largest part of the SSLC sample is located in domain Great Paramaribo. Figure 4 shows the geographical distribution of SSLC sample PSUs across the country (including PSUs in domain Interior), whereas Figure 5 zooms in on the sample PSUs selected in Great Paramaribo.

Domain Interior presents a different scenario since it overlaps with the country's region that is not covered by the EBS network and thus has no available sampling frame at the household level. The sample in this domain also includes a two-stage design. In the first stage, the villages operated as PSUs. A sample of villages was selected with PPS from a list of villages provided by the Ministry of Natural Resources, using the village total population as a measure of size.² At that point, a household listing operation was conducted in each selected village, and a systematic random sample of households was drawn in each of them.

The 2022 sample included the 20 villages from the 2016-2017 sample plus 6 additional new villages. Table 1 displays the list of sample villages in domain Interior, the corresponding district, the tribe and the quarter when the village was surveyed.

3. ESTIMATION AND SAMPLING ERRORS

The SSLC sample design allows for obtaining estimates at the national level and for each of the three geographic domains (Great Paramaribo, Rest of the Coastal Region and the Interior) and also for the two subdomains within the domain Great Paramaribo (Paramaribo and Paramaribo Outskirts). The SSLC does not provide reliable estimates at the district level or at the EBS CA level.

Base weights were computed to account for the unequal inclusion probabilities by domain in accordance with the SSLC sample design. Once fieldwork was finalized, the base weights were adjusted for

nonresponse³ and calibrated to generate the final weights included in the SSLC data files. Annex 1 describes the calculation of the SSLC 2022 sampling weights.

When estimating sampling errors (expressed in the sampling variances, standard errors, coefficients of variation and confidence intervals) for statistics such as means, proportions and ratios, as well as linear and non-linear regression parameters, all SSLC complex sample design features (stratification, clustering, design-based weighting and nonresponse adjustments) need to be accounted for. If the complex sample design is not accounted for, standard statistical software will assume that the sample is a simple random sample, which would result in unrealistically low sampling variances. Hence, standard errors would be understated, confidence intervals would be narrower than expected and test statistics would be biased.

The two most common approaches to estimating sampling errors for complex sample data are through: (1) the Taylor Series Linearization (TSL) of the estimator and the corresponding approximation to its variance; and (2) the use of resampling variance estimation techniques such as balanced repeated replication (BRR), jackknife repeated replication (JRR) and bootstrap. Stata and other statistical software packages use the TSL method as the default for estimating sampling errors for complex sample data. Annex 2 indicates the Stata syntax that should be used when analyzing SSLC data to account for its sample design features and weighting.

As an example, based on the TSL approach, Table 2 presents the estimates, standard errors, 95% confidence intervals and coefficients of variation for a set of SSLC selected indicators at the national level.⁴

The standard error is the square root of the sampling variance. The coefficient of variation is a relative measure of the standard error, calculated as the ratio between the standard error and the point estimate (it is usually expressed in percentage terms). As a rule of thumb, estimates with coefficients of variation of 1 percent or lower are considered to have a very high level of precision. Coefficients of variation between 1 and 3 percent are generally classified as very good, from 3 to 5 percent as good, 5 to 10 percent as acceptable, and 10 to 15 percent as large. Above 15 percent is classified as too large and the corresponding estimate is considered unreliable.

4. SURVEY TOOLS AND METHODS

Consistent with the SSLC's core objective, the survey captures data on the living conditions of the Surinamese population with a focus on consumption and expenditure. It also captures information on labor and non-labor income and includes modules on employment, food security, mental health, health, education, use of information and communication technology (ICT), social safety net programs, early childhood development, crime, immigration and housing. Additionally, the survey includes an anthropometric module, given the concern for assessing the nutritional status of children.

Questionnaire

The SSLC 2022 questionnaire was scripted into a CAPI (Computer Assisted Personal Interviewing) application and the interviews were implemented in tablets.

The questionnaire is divided into 20 modules, some of which are further subdivided into parts as follows:

- Module 0: Cover
- Module 1: Basic Demographics of Household Members
- Module 2: Migration
- Module 3: Education
- Module 17: Information and Communications Technology (ICT)
- Module 4: Government Social Safety Net Programs
- Module 18: Mental Health
- Module 5: Health
- Module 6: Pregnancy, Healthcare and Fertility
- Module 7: Children⁵
 - Part A: Childcare, Early Development, etc.
 - Part B: Anthropometrics
- Module 8: Crime and Personal Safety
- Module 9: Employment
- Module 10: Income and Financial Inclusion
- Module 11: Personal Expenses
- Module 12: Agriculture and Animal Breeding
- Module 13: Housing
- Module 14: Household Consumption and Expenses
 - Part A: Consumption of Food and Beverages in the past 7 days
 - o Part B: Non-food Expenses in the past 30 days
 - Part C: Expenses on Clothing and Footwear in the past 3 months
 - o Part D: Non-food Expenses in the past 12 months
- Module 19: Food Insecurity
- Module 20 Shocks and Resilience
- Module 21: Attitudes

The SSLC 2022 questionnaire is reproduced in full in Annex 3.

Database

The SSLC database is organized into five files, based on the nature of the statistical units observed. With few exceptions, all data recorded in a specific questionnaire part are stored in only one of these files, as shown below:

The SSLC codebook, with the features of all the variables in the database is included in Annex 4.

Public use Database - Anonymization

Each of the SSLC data files has two versions: a "Restricted" version, which contains all the variables reported on the questionnaire, as well as the weights and sample design variables required for the analysis; and a "Public" version, from which identifiers (such as the respondent names, addresses, phone numbers and household geocodes) have been excluded to guarantee confidentiality.

The SSLC Approach to Household Consumption

Household consumption is reported in Modules 11 and 14. Module 11 asks individual members about their personal expenses out of the home (e.g., meals bought and consumed away from home, bus and taxi fares, gasoline, cell phone top-ups, etc.), whereas Module 14 asks designated respondents about the consumption of the household as a whole (e.g., meals at home, laundry bleach, bottled gas, purchase of furniture, etc.).

Module 14 is divided into three parts. Part 14A reports food consumption, and parts 14B, 14C and 14D report non-food expenditures over the past 30 days, the past 3 months and the past 12 months, respectively.

Part 14A on food consumption applies the Last Purchase Recall (LPR) method. This method first identifies the food items that were actually consumed (i.e., eaten or drunk) at home during the past 7 days. Then, it asks further, depending on whether the item is ever purchased or not:

- For the *items that are usually purchased,* it asks about the frequency of household purchase, the quantity purchased and the amount spent on the <u>last purchase</u>.
- For the *items that are never purchased*, it asks about the sources of acquisition (e.g., self-production, gifts, government transfers, etc.) and the quantity generally <u>consumed per week</u>.

In the case of the *purchased food* this questioning scheme differs from the one generally used by most surveys when reporting food consumption by recall. The LPR method anchors the estimation of food purchased to a specific factual event (the last purchase) rather than using the loosely defined notion of "consumption in a given reference period" (typically the past week), as is done by most surveys. This approach proved quite successful in practice.

It is worth highlighting that, in the case of the purchased food items, the estimation of yearly food consumption and expenditures needs to be done carefully since the annualization factor to be used should be specific to each item, depending on the particular frequency with which the household buys that item. To simplify the analysis, an annualization coefficient has already been computed for every recorded food item and is included in file RT140 as variable <code>anncoeff</code>. This coefficient brings the quantities consumed (for purchased and non-purchased food items) and the amounts spent (for purchased items) to a standardized annual estimate.

Non-food transactions from parts 14B, 14C and 14D are all recorded in the database file RT141, also with an annualization coefficient annoeff.

Education expenses and most of health expenses are addressed in Modules 3 and 5 respectively (at the individual level) and recorded in file RT002.

Geocoding

The SSLC recorded the geographical coordinates (latitude and longitude) of every interviewed household. These data are included in the Restricted version of file RT001. However, due to confidentiality reasons, the Public version of file RT001 contains only the geocodes corresponding to the centroid of the PSU where the sample household is located (variables lat_cen and long_cen). These data can be of use for spatial statistical analysis.

5. FIELDWORK ORGANIZATION

The survey was fielded by one manager, five supervisors and eighteen interviewers. Each interviewer was responsible for visiting PSUs with 12 sample households each, over the 12 months of data collection. Each interviewer spent one fortnight⁶ in each of the assigned PSUs.

Interviewing. A key feature of SSLC's fieldwork is that households had to be visited on several occasions due to three different reasons:

- The questionnaire is very comprehensive and includes a large number of modules and questions, which makes it unlikely to be applied in one single sitting without affecting data quality;
- Given the specificity of some of the individual survey topics, no proxy respondents were permitted (i.e., each member was asked to answer personally the questions related to his/her individual status).
 Children (defined as persons below 15 years of age) were an exception, and an adult in charge was asked to respond on their behalf;
- Not every topic related to the household may be known to the same extent and with the same accuracy by every household member. Hence, some members may be more suitable to answer about particular topics than others. For instance, the spouse may be a very appropriate respondent about

food consumption, but the head of household may be better suited to respond about non-food expenditures.

As a result, interviewers usually had to make separate appointments with different household members on different days and times to collect all the data required in the questionnaire.

Supervisors. Each supervisor was in charge of overseeing a team of interviewers and taking the anthropometric measures of children 5 years of age and younger. Usually, supervisors' allocation is fixed, with one supervisor assigned to a particular interviewer across the whole survey. In the case of Suriname, this allocation shifted over time, which helped to ensure fieldwork quality.

6. THE COMPREHENSIVE FIELDWORK QUALITY CONTROL (CFQC) SYSTEM

All the collected data by the SSLC was subject to the Comprehensive Fieldwork Quality Control (CFQC) system throughout the entire fieldwork to immediately detect errors and undesired interviewer effects while in the field and take corrective actions on time. The SSLC 2022 CFQC system included the following components:

- 1. **Intra-questionnaire checks:** An extensive list of checks and validations were built into the CAPI questionnaire to provide instant alerts to interviewers. These included range checks, consistency checks, and identification of missing values and "Don't knows".
- 2. Batch-process reports: If an interviewer overrode a CAPI alert during the interview, he/she should add a comment to the pertaining question explaining the reason. At the end of every day, the CAPI platform ran a batch process on the survey server across all the uploaded interviews and generated a report that showed which CAPI alerts and how many had been overridden by each interviewer, plus any remaining issues in the data. The survey management team would then inform the field supervisors, who would ask the interviewers to clarify and correct the data if necessary.
- 3. **Monitoring of aggregate quality indicators:** On top of the quality checks carried out by the CAPI application during the data entry, which focuses on each individual interview, it is also necessary to monitor the quality of the overall work done by the interviewers. For this purpose, the data uploaded to the survey server was processed daily to compute a series of quality indicators that were visualized on an Online Quality Control Dashboard. The survey management team analyzed the quality indicators on an interviewer basis and decided whether special supervision was needed for any particular interviewer whose work appeared to be inadequate⁷. This monitoring provided early warnings so that corrective actions could be taken swiftly.
- 4. Randomized audio supervision: Randomized audio supervision was conducted using RASTM (Randomized Audio Supervision), an in-house application for interview auditing. Random parts of 100% of interviews were recorded and assessed by trained auditors to ensure the accuracy of the data registered by the interviewers and compliance with interviewing protocols. Initially, interviews to be audited were selected equally across all interviewers. After the first week of data


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


- collection, the audit began to focus on interviewers with issues identified through the analysis of the quality indicators in the Online QC Dashboard. The audit results were used to prepare regular audio supervision reports presented to the interviewers in regular meetings. These reports included a score of each audited interview and specific question-level comments.
- 5. **Monitoring meetings:** Regular meetings were held among the Project Manager, the Field Manager, the Quality Control Officer, and the supervisors to analyze the quality indicators in the online dashboard. During these meetings, the Project Manager indicated the issues found, overall and by interviewer, explained how they should be solved and set improvement goals to be assessed in the subsequent monitoring meeting.
- 6. **Audio supervision feedback meetings:** Regular meetings were held among the Field Manager, the Quality Control Officer, the auditors, supervisors and interviewers. During these meetings, the Quality Control Officer and auditors presented the latest audio supervision report to the interviewers, covering the identified issues and opportunities for improvement, overall and by the interviewer.

SSLC Online Quality Control Dashboard














SSLC Randomized Audio Supervision (RAS™)









ANNEX 1

SSLC 2022 Weighting

Introduction

In 2016 a two-stage probability proportionate to size sample of households was selected in Suriname for a national survey of economic conditions. The sample employed two major strata, urban and rural. The rural portion of the sample was selected using a frame consisting of lists of villages and measures of size obtained from national statistics sources, and field lists of housing units in selected villages. The sample design may be described as essentially a stratified two-stage probability proportionate to size sample of housing units.

For the urban stratum, though, national statistics resources were not readily available. For example, lists of blocks or other census units in cities and measures of size from the most recent census of population and housing for each block could not be accessed from national statistical services. However, the national electricity utility would provide a list of residential electric meter connections in urban locations that cover 90% of the population. (Electricity in rural villages is provided through local generator facilities, which do not have readily available electric meter lists). This memorandum addresses only sampling methods used in the urban areas of the sample.

2016 Sample Selection Probabilities

An element sample, such as a stratified random or systematic selection, of electric meter addresses would generate sample addresses for the proposed survey, but the travel costs to reach all sample households would cost more than a sample where sample addresses were grouped together geographically.

An algorithm was developed to group metered addresses along streets into clusters that could serve as Primary Sampling Units (PSUs) and re- duce data collection costs. Approximately 120,000 meters in the frame were grouped into $A_{16}=4{,}300$ PSUs of an average size of approximately 28 metered units. A total of $a_{h(16)}=216$ PSUs were selected.

PSUs were grouped into H strata. A stratified probability proportionate to size (PPS) sample was selected in which $a_{h(16)}$ PSUs were selected within the h^{th} stratum. Let $B_{ha(16)}$ denote the size, the number of metered units, of the a^{th} PSU in the h^{th} stratum at the time of the 2016 sample selection, where $a=1,2,\ldots,A_h$; $h=1,2,\ldots,H$. Within each sample PSU in stratum h, a sample of $b_{h(16)}=15$ metered units were selected. With expected nonresponse of three units on average across all PSUs, the target number of completed interviews per 2016 PSU was 12. For the urban portion of the sample, then, the probability of selection of metered units in stratum h is

In principle, this selection of metered units in two stages is expected to be equal chance. No base weights were needed to compensate for unequal chances of selection. Combination nonresponse adjustment and poststratification weights were developed though.

2022 Supplement Sample Design

In 2022 a new economic survey with health questions concerning COVID-19 was planned. The sample design aimed to return to metered unit addresses interviewed in the 2016 survey. Sample sizes were anticipated to decline for the 2022 survey due to attrition nonresponse losses in this second round of the survey.

A supplemental sample of metered units was selected to provide sample to restore sample size losses due to attrition nonresponse. The 2022 national electricity metered list served as the frame for the 2022 supplement sample. The 2022 list had approximately 17% more metered units than the 2016 frame, approximately 144,000 metered units. The PSU assignment algorithm was applied to the 2022 metered list and re-generated the 4,300 2016 PSUs and an additional 770 PSUs consisting of new metered units. The number of 2022 PSUs was $A_{21}=5{,}090$. This list of PSUs was grouped into the same H strata established in 2016 sample selection.

An initial stratified PPS sample of 276 PSUs was selected, with probabilities proportionate to $B_{ha(22)}$ the number of 2022 metered units in each of the $A_{h(21)}$ PSUs.

The expected metered unit sample size from the supplement of 276 PSUs was expected to generate more supplement sample than required for the target 2022 goal of 2,500 completed interviews. A subsample of 168 of the 276 were chosen for the final supplement sample. Around fifty of the 168 PSUs were PSUs selected in 2016. These PSUs will be referred to as overlap, and the remaining 108 as non-overlap.

2022 Within PSU Selection Probabilities

The 2022 selection probabilities for "continuing" PSUs (that is, those present in the 2016 and again in the 2022 frames) have a metered unit probability for 2016 as well as for 2022. The 2016 and 2022 probabilities are summed to obtain the 2022 probability of selection. The within PSU selection for 2022 selected PSUs differed between 2022 "continuing" and "new" PSUs. Subsampling in both types of 2022 PSUs, choosing a target of $b_{h(21)}=15$ metered units within a selected PSU. But the subsampling selection procedures, and hence the probabilities, vary across the types.

2022 Within PSU Subsampling in "Continuing" PSUs

"Continuing" PSUs were in 2022 composed of $B_{ha(16)S}$ "stable" (S) units which were present in the 2016 and 2022 PSU, added $B_{ha(21)E}$ "entrant" (E) units which came into the PSU between 2016 and 2022, and subtracted $B_{ha(21)R}$ removed (R) metered units dropped from the PSU between 2016 and 2022. The 2022 measure of size for the a^th PSU in stratum h is thus

¹ The 2021 metered unit probability also includes subtraction of the product of the 2016 and 2021 probabilities, but since product is very small relative to the 2016 or 2021 probabilities, for the sake of simplicity, the product will not be included in the specification of the 2021 probabilities.

The number of "stable" metered units is thus $B_{ha(16)S} = B_{ha(16)} + B_{ha(21)R}$.

Metered units available for selection in the 2022 within PSU selection included those counted in equation [2], but the count could have been reduced by the number of 2016 completed interviews from the PSU. If the 2022 PSU selected was overlapping, metered units that had been selected and successfully interviewed in 2016 were removed from the list of 2022 metered units before the 2022 selection was made. Let $b_{ha(16)}$ denote the count of 2016 successfully interviewed units in the a^{th} PSU in stratum h. The total number of metered units available for selection in overlap PSUs was

If, however, the 2022 PSU was non-overlapping, the number of metered units available for selection within the PSU was as above in equation (2).

Because of the process excluding 2016 completed interview units from within overlapping PSUs before 2022 selection, the within probability of selection for 2022 metered units must account for both the chance of the PSU being overlapping (that is, selected in 2016 and 2022) and, if overlapping, the chance of the 2016 units not being selected in 2016 and thus available for selection in 2022.

Consequently, the within PSU selection probability for 2022 metered units has a sum of the product of three probabilities and another the product of two probabilities:

This within PSU selection probability applies to all within PSU selections, whether 2022 "entrant" or "stable" metered units.²

2022 Within PSU Subsampling in "New" PSUs

"New" PSUs had zero probability of selection in 2016. Considerations of PSUs or metered units having been selected in 2016, or entrant or removal units in 2022, are irrelevant. The 2022 within selection for "new" PSUs is

2022 Selection Probabilities

There are three overall selection probabilities for 2022 metered units that depend on the 2022 PSU and metered unit type: 1) "continuing" PSU "stable" metered units, 2) "continuing" PSU "entrant" units, and 3) "new PSU" metered units.

For "stable" units in "continuing" PSUs, there is a sum of the 2016 and 2022 probabilities of selection for metered units. Both <u>probabilities</u> have a PSU selection probability multiplied by a within PSU probability:

The 2022 selection probability for "entrant" units in a "continuing" PSU does not have a 2016 probability of selection. Thus, "entrant" probability of selection is the same as equation [6], except for the 2016 probability of selection:

Base Weight Computation

The probabilities in equations [6] and [7] require size measures and counts that were not recorded in the 2022 selection process. In particular, $B_{ha(16)E}$, $B_{ha(21)R}$, and $b_{ha(16)}$ are not available for each 2022 "continuing" PSU.

It is known that the values of $B_{ha(21)R}$ are small relative to $B_{ha(21)}$.

The following assumptions were applied to the probability computation to simplify weight calculation:

- $B_{ha(21)E} \approx 0$
- $b'_{ha(16)} = b_{ha(16)}$

Computing the probabilities for "continuing" PSU "stable" and "entrant" as well as "new" PSU metered units in the sample require the following data:

- The number of PSUs selected in each stratum for both 2016 and 2022 (the $a_{h(16)}$ and $a_{h(21)}$).
- The 2016 and 2022 measures of size for each selected PSU ($B_{ha(16)}$ and $B_{ha(21)}$).
- The 2016 and 2022 stratum sums of measures of size.
- The number of metered units selected in 2016 or 2022 ($b_{h(16)}$ and $b_{h(21)}$).

Base probability weight computations depend on being able to identify the three types of cases for which probabilities have been specified ("stable" units in "continuing" PSUs, "entrant units in "continuing" PSUs, and units in "new" PSUs). Identifying cases in "continuing" and "new" PSUs should not be difficult. Identifying "stable" and "entrant" units may be more challenging.

The base weights that compensate for unequal probabilities of selection are the inverse of the three probabilities of selection.

Weight Nonresponse Adjustment

All SSLC 2022 sample units are subject to given response and non-response mechanisms. The non-panel units, not interviewed in 2016, have never been visited by the field staff before and are subject to first-time nonresponse, either because of a refusal to participate in the survey, nobody could be found at home after several visits, or other reasons. On the other hand, the panel units, already interviewed in 2016, were subject to first-time nonresponse back in 2016 and to attrition nonresponse in 2022. Both nonresponse mechanisms must be accounted for to reduce any potential nonresponse bias.

A. First-time nonresponse adjustment

As mentioned, the new non-panel units selected in 2022 were subject to first-time nonresponse in 2022, so their base weights, computed in the previous section, were adjusted accordingly to compensate for any potential nonresponse bias. A class-based nonresponse adjustment was used, with the class being each of the ten country districts.

The weighting class nonresponse adjustment is based on the inverse of the weighted response rate estimated in each district, which is the ratio of the sum of the base weights of all non-panel units (respondents and nonrespondents) in the district to the sum of the base weights of respondents in that district.

where nr_d is the nonresponse adjustment factor that should be applied to responding non-panel units j in discrict d. R and NR indicate the respondent and nonrespondent units, respectively, and w_{0j} is the base weight of each unit.

Thus, the nonresponse adjusted weights w_{1j} for 2022 non-panel respondent units in district d are

B. Attrition nonresponse adjustment

The panel units were subject to first-time nonresponse in 2016, and attrition nonresponse in 2022. Both must be accounted for, in order to reduce any potential bias. The attrition nonresponse weighting adjustment involved the following steps.

1. Identify a set of variables collected in SSLC 2016 as potential predictors of response in 2022.

- 2. Examine any missing data patterns in those 2016 preselected variables.
- 3. Impute any item missing values using a Multivariate Imputation by Chain Equations (MICE) procedure.
- 4. Run two alternate techniques and select the most efficient one, i.e., the one that yields smaller standard errors for key survey estimates:
 - 4a. Run a *random forest algorithm* over the potential predicting variables identified in SSLC 2016 to determine the best predictors of SSLC 2022 response, and form a set of response cells defined by the interactions of the identified response predictors.
 - 4b. Fit a *response propensity model* using stepwise logistic regression and obtaining estimated response propensities, with the 2016 preselected variables as independent variables and a dummy 2022 response indicator as outcome variable.
- 5. The response propensity model proved more efficient than the random forest algorithm. Therefore, the inverse of the estimated propensity scores estimated in Step 4b were grouped into deciles and the median value for each decile was used as attrition adjustment factor.
- 6. Adjust the base weight for 2016 nonresponse and multiply it by the 2022 attrition adjustment factor computed in Step 5, to obtain an attrition adjusted weight

The estimated response propensity $\widehat{\Phi}$ i can be written as

Two response propensity models were fit separately, one for domains Great Paramaribo and Rest of the Costal Region together, and another for the Interior domain. Tables A1 and A2 show the paramaters of the two models.

Variables with a regression coefficient significant at the 0.1 level were kept in the final model to estimate the 2022 response propensity for the panel units.

Weight Calibration Adjustment

The weights for each respondent unit received a final calibration adjustment. This procedure uses auxiliary information from an available external source and contributes to the weight adjustments already made by correcting possible under- or over-representation of some population groups, originated by possible coverage errors in the sampling frames used to select the survey sample.

The SSLC 2022 applied a raking calibration with a logit distance function since this fitted a more exact adjustment on the calibration auxiliaries. It used the World Bank population projections for Suriname 2022³ to adjust the weights for sex and age distributions at the time of the survey. The following population totals were used:

- number of women in the household aged 0-14 years,
- number of men in the household aged 0-14 years,

- number of women in the household aged 15-64 years,
- number of men in the household aged 15-64 years,
- number of women in the household aged 65 years and above,
- number of men in the household aged 65 years and above,

The calibration also considered the average household size and the population distribution by districts from the Suriname 2012 Census.

To avoid producing two sets of weights, one for households and one for individuals, the SSLC employed an integrated calibration method that produces a single weight, which allows for estimates at both household and individual levels. That is, the weight for each household member is the same as for his/her household.

Weight Trimming

The distributions of the resulting weights were examined to decide whether any trimming was needed. Weight trimming seeks to reduce excess variation in the weights, introduced by nonresponse adjustments and calibration, and thus mitigate the inflation of the standard errors of the survey estimates due to weighting.

The trimming process took the largest weights within each country region and reduced their value to the next largest weight value. These trimmed weights were then recalibrated to the same population totals used in the first calibration.

Trimming may also change estimates if done carelessly, particularly if the value of a variable with a large weight is itself large. Therefore, the trimming process included a sensitivity analysis to assess whether changes in estimates occured as weights were trimmed.

Trimming was carried out in a series of rounds within each district. Each time the largest weights in a round were trimmed, a set of key survey weighted estimates were computed for the overall sample. If the relative change of the survey estimate was more than 2% of the estimated value obtained before weight trimming, the trimming round was not used. The trimming process thus sought to reduce unnecessary weight variation while avoiding significant changes in key survey estimates. Finally, trimmed weights were recalibrated to the same population totals used in the first calibration.

ANNEX 2
