Suriname Survey of Living Conditions 2016/17

Methodological Report

Sistemas Integrales, March 2018

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Introduction

The Suriname Survey of Living Conditions (SSLC) 2016/17 is an effort of the Inter-American Development Bank (IDB) with the support of the EnergieBedrijvan Suriname's (state-owned electrical company of Suriname) and the Central Bank of Suriname. It visited about 2,000 households from October 2016 through September 2017 and collected data on the most important dimensions of welfare, which will support evidence-based policy making in areas such as education, health, housing, employment and poverty alleviation. The survey also gathered information on the consumption patterns, income and expenditures of the Surinamese households, intended to update the Consumption Price Index basket and inform the System of National Accounts.

The SSLC was designed by Sistemas Integrales and its fieldwork was carried out by DataFruit, a local survey firm, with the steering and technical direction of Sistemas Integrales. This report describes the main methodological aspects of the survey – the sample design and the pertaining estimation procedures, the topics covered by the questionnaire, and the organization and quality assurance of fieldwork – and presents the structure and contents of the resulting datasets, which will enable many forthcoming analytical activities.

Sample design

The SSLC target population includes all persons living in households and, following the conventional practice for population surveys, excludes the institutionalized population, i.e. persons living in prisons, nursing homes, long-term or dependent care facilities, long-term mining camps or military camps. According to the 2012 Population and Housing Census, Suriname had a household population of 534,932 persons living in 140,367 households.

The SSLC covers the full Suriname territory and its sample includes 2,033 households and all their members. Since one of SSLC's main objectives is to measure the consumption and expenditure patterns of the Surinamese population, the sample is evenly distributed over 12 months, from October 2016 through September 2017. The overall yearly sample was randomly allocated into 12 smaller monthly samples called replicates and each replicate spreads across the entire country territory and is nationally representative by itself. Thus, the overall SSLC sample is attained through the aggregation of the 12 monthly replicates, achieving not only spatial but also time representativeness and managing to capture consumption seasonality.

Contrary to the usual practice in other Caribbean countries and other regions, the General Bureau of Statistics of Suriname did not grant access to the latest Population Census data at the enumeration area level, which is generally used to inform household sample designs. Nevertheless, the survey benefitted from the support of the EnergieBedrijvan Suriname (EBS).




Figure 1. EBS Connection Areas and Suriname districts

EBS is the only electrical company in Suriname. Its network supplies the largest part of the national territory (all districts, except for a part of Brokopondo and Sipaliwini) and has a full household coverage in those areas. These two facts allowed the SSLC to utilize the EBS customer database as a complete and up-to-date sampling frame at the household level in the EBS-supplied areas. EBS organizes its network in 27 Connection Areas (CAs) that cover the largest part of eight districts (Paramaribo, Wanica, Nickerie, Coronie, Saramacca, Commewijne, Marowijne and Para), as well as the northern part of Brokopondo and a small portion of Sipaliwini (Figure 1).

On the other hand, the areas not covered by the EBS network (the southern half of Brokopondo, the largest part of Sipaliwini, and small portions of a few other districts) are supplied by the Ministry of Natural Resources, which provides the small villages located in these areas with electrical generators and fuel. The Ministry of Natural Resources does not keep record of the households served in these areas, so the only available sampling frame is the list of the villages located therein.

Given the survey's analytical objectives and the data available, Suriname population was split in three geographic estimation domains:





Figure 2. Detailed view of EBS Connection Areas in domain Great Paramaribo

- 1. Great Paramaribo: 13 EBS Connection Areas that cover Paramaribo district and its peripheries (Figure 2). It includes Paramaribo's population plus part of the population in contiguous districts (Wanica, Saramacca and Commewijne), who generally commute to Paramaribo on a daily basis. This domain has the largest population and the highest density by far. It may be broken down in two subdomains: Paramaribo and Paramaribo outskirts.
- 2. **Rest of the Coastal Region**: the remaining 14 EBS Connection Areas in the coast, i.e. the coast excluding Great Paramaribo (Figure 3).
- 3. **Interior**: the territory not covered by EBS electrical network and supplied by the Ministry of Natural Resources. Its population gathers in 137 small villages located in most part of Sipaliwini, the southern half of Brokopondo and small portions of other districts. Although it covers a much larger territory than the other two domains, it is the smallest domain in terms of population.

Different sampling strategies were implemented in domains Great Paramaribo and Rest of the Coastal Region on the one hand, and in the Interior on the other hand.

In *domains Paramaribo* and *Rest of the Coastal Region*, where EBS coverage is complete, the sampling frame was based on the up-to-date EBS customer database. The sample has a two-stage design stratified by EBS Connection Areas. In the first sampling stage streets operated as primary sampling units (PSUs) and a sample of streets was selected in each of the 27 Connection Areas with probability proportional to their size (PPS), using the number of households in each street as measure of size. Overall, 169 PSUs were selected in domain Great Paramaribo and 47 in domain Rest of the Coastal Region. In the second sampling stage, a systematic random sample of 12 households was drawn within each selected PSU, out of the EBS customer database.




Figure 4. SSLC sample PSUs (overall sample)




Figure 5. SSLC sample PSUs in domain Great Paramaribo

In line with the high concentration of Suriname population in Paramaribo and its outskirts, the largest part of the SSLC sample is located in domain Great Paramaribo. Figure 4 shows the geographical distribution of SSLC sample PSUs across the country (including PSUs in domain Interior), whereas Figure 5 zooms in the sample PSUs selected in Great Paramaribo.

Domain Interior presents a different scenario since it overlaps with the country region that is not covered by EBS network and there is therefore no available sampling frame at the household level. The sample in this domain has also a two-stage design. In the first stage the villages operated as PSUs and a sample of 19 villages was selected with PPS out of a list of villages provided by the Ministry of Natural Resources, using the village total population as a measure of size¹. At that point, a household listing operation was conducted in each selected village and a systematic random sample of 12 households was then drawn in each of them². Table 1 contains the list of sample villages in domain Interior, the corresponding district, the corresponding tribe and the quarter when the village was surveyed.

¹ Since the total Census population for each village are not publicly delivered by the General Bureau of Statistics of Suriname, these data were provided by the Ministry of Natural Resources.

² 2 clusters of 12 villages each were selected in Gujaba due to its population size significantly larger than the rest of the villages in the sample.

Estimation and sampling errors

The SSLC sample design permits to obtain estimates at the national level, for each of the three geographic domains (Great Paramaribo, Rest of the Coastal Region and the Interior) and for the two subdomains within Great Paramaribo (Paramaribo and Paramaribo Outskirts). The SSLC does not provide reliable estimates neither at the district level nor at the EBS Connection Area level.

Base weights were computed to account for the unequal inclusion probabilities, in accordance with the SSLC sample design. Once fieldwork was finalized, the base weights were adjusted for nonresponse³ to generate the final weights included in the SSLC data files.

When estimating sampling errors (expressed in the sampling variances, standard errors, coefficients of variation and confidence intervals) for statistics such as means, proportions and ratios as well as linear and non-linear regression parameters, all SSLC complex sample design features (stratification, clustering, weighting due to unequal inclusion probabilities and nonresponse adjustments) need to be accounted for. If the complex sample design is not accounted for, standard statistical software will assume that the sample is a simple random sample (SRS), which would result in biased estimates and unrealistically low sampling variances. Hence, standard errors would be understated, confidence intervals would be narrower than expected and test statistics would be biased.

The two most usual approaches to estimating sampling errors for complex sample data are through 1) the Taylor Series Linearization (TSL) of the estimator and the corresponding approximation to its variance, or through 2) the use of resampling variance estimation techniques such as balanced repeated replication (BRR), jackknife repeated replication (JRR) and bootstrap. Stata and other statistical software packages use the TSL method as the default for estimating sampling errors for complex sample data. Annex 1 indicates the Stata syntax that should be used when analyzing SSLC data to account for its sample design features and weighting.

As an example, Table 2 presents the estimates, standard errors, 95% confidence intervals and coefficients of variation for a set of SSLC selected indicators at the national level⁴.

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³ The total unweighted nonresponse rate (Refusals, No contacts and Other Reasons for eligible cases) was 24.3%, which is lower than the average of similar surveys of living conditions and household budget in Latin America and the Caribbean.

⁴ Due to the different sample sizes in each domain, estimates at the national level and in domain Great Paramaribo are more precise (i.e. have a lower sampling error) than in domains Rest of the Coastal Region and Interior.

Survey tools and methods

The core objective of the SSLC is to report the living conditions of the Surinamese population with a focus on consumption and expenditures. The survey also captures information about personal income (through wage earning or self-employment) and includes modules on immigration, health, education, government social safety net programs, early childhood development, crime, employment, housing and emigration. In addition, the survey also includes an anthropometric module given the concern for assessing the nutritional status of children.

Data on emigrants are obtained indirectly through the interviewed respondents and refer to those individuals who used to reside in the surveyed households but have been living abroad for over 6 months at the time of the interview⁵.

Questionnaire

The SSLC 2016/17 questionnaire is divided into 16 modules, some of which are further subdivided into parts as follows:

- Module 0: Cover page
- Module 1: Basic Demographics of household members
- Module 2: Migration
- Module 3: Education
- Module 4: Government social safety net programs
- Module 5: Health
- Module 6: Pregnancy, healthcare and Fertility
- Module 7: Children⁶
 - Part A: Childcare, early development, etc.
 - Part B: Anthropometrics
- Module 8: Crime and personal safety
- Module 9: Employment
- Module 10: Income and Financial inclusion
- Module 11: Personal expenses in the past 7 days
- Module 12: Agriculture and Animal Breeding
 - Part A: Landholding
 - o Part B: Agriculture
 - Part C: Livestock and poultry
 - o Part D: Crops and animal by-products
 - Part E: Fishing
 - Part F: Expenses on agricultural inputs
 - Part G: Agricultural assets

⁵ The SSLC data on emigrants should be interpreted with caution since they only refer to those emigrants who used to live in a household that still exists in Suriname, i.e. the SSLC does not capture any data about those emigrants that moved out of the country along with their entire household.

⁶ Part 7A was recorded directly by the interviewers on the questionnaire. Part 7B was completed by the survey supervisors, who re-visited the households shortly thereafter to measure and weigh children with standard UNICEF tools and methods.

- Module 13: Housing
- Module 14: Household consumption and expenses
 - o Part A: Consumption of food and beverages in the past 7 days
 - o Part B: Non-food expenses in the past 30 days
 - o Part C: Expenses on clothing and footwear in the past 3 months
 - o Part D: Non-food expenses in the past 12 months
- Module 15: Emigration
- Module 16: Household energy consumption

The SSLC 2016/17 questionnaire is reproduced in full in *Annex 2*.

Database

The SSLC database is organized in 11 files, depending on the nature of the statistical units observed. With few exceptions, all of the data recorded in a specific questionnaire part are stored in only one of these files, as shown below:

The SSLC codebook, with the characteristics of all variables in the database is included as *Annex 3*.

Public use database - Anonymization

Each of the SSLC data files has two versions: a "Restricted" version, that contains all the variables reported on the questionnaire, as well as the weights and sample design variables required for the analyses; and a "Public" version, from which certain variables (such as the respondent names, addresses, phone numbers and household geocodes) have been excluded to guarantee statistical confidentiality.

The SSLC approach to household consumption

Household consumption is reported in Modules 11 and 14. Module 11 asks individual members about their personal expenses out of the home (e.g. meals bought and consumed away from home, bus and taxi fares, gasoline, cell phone top-ups, etc.), whereas Module 14 asks designated respondents about the consumption of the household as a whole (e.g. meals at home, laundry bleach, bottled gas, purchase of furniture, etc.).

Module 14 is divided into three parts. Part 14A reports food consumption and parts 14B, 14C and 14D report non-food expenditures over the past 30 days, the past 3 months and the past 12 months respectively.

The food consumption part first identifies the food items that were actually consumed (i.e. eaten or drank) at home during the past 7 days. Then, depending on whether the item is ever purchased or not:

- For the *items that are usually purchased*, the <u>frequency</u> with which the household buys it is reported, as well as the quantity purchased and the amount spent in the <u>last purchase</u>.
- For the *items that are never purchased*, the sources of acquisition (e.g. self-production, gifts, government transfers, etc.) and the quantity generally consumed per week are reported.

In the case of the *purchased food* this questioning scheme differs from the one generally used by most surveys when reporting food consumption by recall. The SSLC anchors the estimation of food purchased to a specific factual event (the last purchase) rather than use the loosely defined notion of "consumption in a given reference period" (typically the past week), like most surveys do. This approach proved quite successful in practice.

It is worth highlighting that, in the case of the purchased food items, the estimation of yearly food consumption and expenditures needs to be done carefully since the annualization factor to be used should be specific to each item, depending on the particular frequency with which the household buys that item. To simplify the analysis, an annualization coefficient has already been computed for every recorded food item and is included in file RT140 as variable anncoeff. This coefficient brings the quantities consumed (for purchased and non-purchased food items) and the amounts spent (for purchased items) to a standardized annual estimate.

Non-food transactions from parts 14B, 14C and 14D are all recorded in the database file RT141, also with an annualization coefficient annoeff.

Education expenses and most of health expenses are specifically addressed in Modules 3 and 5 respectively (at the individual level) and recorded in file RT002.

Coding of industry and occupation

Most of the categorical questions in the SSLC questionnaire are pre-coded. The only exceptions are the codes of activities and occupations in both Module 9 (Employment) and Module 15 (Emigration).

The coding of industrial activities and occupations is generally considered a very specialized task that requires years of experience and cannot be entrusted to survey fieldworkers. In fact, the ILO 4-digit standard classifications of industry (ISIC) and occupation (ISCO) have hundreds of categories, and their interpretation is far from trivial. For this reason, statistical agencies generally ask the interviewers to simply write down detailed descriptions in the questionnaire, to have a professional coder provide the codes in the office at a later stage. Unfortunately, this can have an impact on the timeliness of the survey data.

The SSLC interviewers were asked to write down detailed descriptions on the questionnaire, as interviewers in other surveys do; and to enter the descriptions themselves in their own computers, to

make them available to both coders and analysts immediately⁷ in the survey datasets. They were also asked to make an effort to actually provide a code, if they could find it in the ISIC and ISCO tables included in the SSLC data entry program, with the help of a built-in phonetic search engine.

The SSLC datasets thus already contain <u>preliminary</u> versions of these codes, along with the detailed textual descriptions needed to generate enhanced versions in the future. The corresponding variables can be found next to each other in the datasets.

Geocoding and population density data

The SSLC recorded the geocodes (latitude and longitude) of every interviewed household. These data are included in the Restricted version of file RT001. However, due to confidentiality reasons, the Public version of file RT001 contains only the geocodes corresponding to the centroid of the PSU where the sample household is located (variables lat_cen and long_cen). These data will be of great use for spatial statistical analysis.

The geocodes of each PSU centroid were also used to obtain an estimate of the population density in the PSU area. Given that the General Bureau of Statistics of Suriname denied access to the census data at the enumeration area level, the SSLC recoursed to the LandScan Database⁸, a worldwide population database developed by the US Department of Energy and the US Department of Defense. The population density figures contained in variable density in file RT001 are based on this external source.

⁸ In the LandScan database worldwide population data is presented in an ESRI compatible raster format of 30 by 30 arc seconds (0.00833 decimal degrees) and is output in a geographic coordinate system with longitude and latitude as x and y map units, and with World Geodetic System (WGS) 1984 as map datum. The values of the cells are population counts representing a 24-hour average, or ambient, population distribution. The LandScan database is available free for US Government agencies. All others do also have access to the data but have to pay for it. The SSLC accessed the LandScan database for Suriname, composed of 14,714 cells (or cell parts), as well as the shape files for all 10 districts and 64 resorts. LandScan is the finest resolution global population distribution data available. The LandScan algorithm uses spatial data and imagery analysis technologies and a multi-variable dasymetric modelling approach to disaggregate census counts within an administrative boundary. Much of the spatial data and imagery processed in the LandScan model is provided by the National Geospatial-Intelligence Agency (NGA). Ancillary information comes from the Census Bureau, US Department of Agriculture and NASA. Data used in the determination of population per grid cell include (i) census and city population information, (ii) various global vector data sets such as VMAP, (iii) digital terrain models, (iv) land cover data resulting from Landsat TM and other sources, (v) various high-resolution earth observation satellite imagery such as IKONOS, QuickBird, etc.

Fieldwork organization

The survey was fielded by one manager, four supervisors and thirteen interviewers. Each interviewer was responsible for visiting 18 PSUs on average with 12 sample households each, over the 12 months of data collection. Each interviewer spent one fortnight⁹ in each of the assigned PSUs.

Interviewing. A key feature of SSLC's fieldwork is that households had to be visited on several occasions, due to three different reasons:

- the questionnaire is very comprehensive and includes a large number of modules and questions, which makes it unlikely to be applied in one single sitting without affecting data quality;
- given the specificity of some of the individual survey topics, no proxy respondents were permitted, i.e. each member was asked to answer personally the questions related to his/her individual status. Children (defined as persons below 15 years of age) were an exception and an adult in charge was asked to respond on his/her behalf;
- not every topic related to the household may be known to the same extent and with the same accuracy by every household member. Hence, some members may be more suitable to answer about particular topics than others. For instance, the spouse may be a very appropriate respondent about food consumption, but the head of household may be fitter to respond about non-food expenditures and about emigrated former household members.

As a result, interviewers usually had to make separate appointments with different household members on different days and times to collect all the data required in the questionnaire.

Supervisors. Each supervisor was in charge of overseeing the interviewers in his team and taking the anthropometric measures of children 5 years of age and younger. Usually, supervisors' allocation is fixed, with one supervisor assigned to a particular interviewer across the whole survey. In the case of Suriname this allocation shifted over time, which helped to ensure fieldwork quality.

⁹ Each month was divided into two fortnights. The first fortnight went from the 1st to the 15th and the second from the 16th to the last day of the month.

The Comprehensive Survey Quality Assurance (CSQA) framework

All the data collected by the SSLC was subject to the Comprehensive Survey Quality Assurance process, which is built on three successive and linked stages: integration of computer quality controls to fieldwork, central monitoring of data quality indicators and on-site fieldwork supervision through double-blind check-up visits.

1. Integration of computer quality controls to fieldwork

Integration of computer-based quality controls to fieldwork has proven key to the success of complex surveys for over 30 years. In the SSLC this did not imply the elimination of paper questionnaires nor the implementation of computer assisted paperless interviewing (CAPI) techniques (see footnote 10). Rather, data were collected on paper questionnaires and were immediately entered by the interviewers themselves using laptops and a data entry program with a set of built-in consistency checks whose purpose is to alert the interviewer of possible mistakes while typing or while recording responses on the questionnaire. Thus, the quality of the data could be checked by the program while the interviewers were still in the field and the identified inconsistencies could be solved by direct verification with the households, which was facilitated by the scheme of multiple visits. Finally, once checked, the data entered in the field was automatically transferred to the survey central team via the internet. Data were subjected to five kinds of checks by the program while being entered: range checks, skip checks, consistency checks, checks against reference data and typographic checks:

Range checks are intended to ensure that every variable in the survey contains only data within a limited domain of valid values. Categorical variables should take on only defined values. For example, for the variable "q13.01 Type of dwelling" the only acceptable codes should be "1" to "5". Any other value is flagged as an error. Chronological variables should contain valid dates and numeric variables are verified to lie within prescribed minimum and maximum values. It is generally convenient to detect and correct range errors at the time of data entry because range errors are often generated while typing rather than at the time of the interview. If the error is merely typographical, the interviewers who enters the data can correct it immediately. However, the data entry program allows the operator to enter an out-of-range value if it correctly reflects what has been observed and was not due to a typographical error. In that case, a written error report is generated so that the supervisor and interviewer can verify the value in a re-visit to the household.

In modules 14B, 14C and 14D (non-food expenditures) range checks are specific to each item (e.g., the range of acceptable values for bottled gas is different from that of cigarettes). In Module 14A the data entry program also controls the consistency between amounts and quantities against a table of implicit unit prices.

Skip checks verify whether the interviewer correctly followed the instructions in the questionnaire to skip certain questions depending on the characteristics of the respondent. For example, a simple check verifies that questions to be asked only to schoolchildren are not recorded for a child who answered "No" to an initial question on current school enrolment. A more complicated check verifies that the right modules of the questionnaire have been filled in for each respondent. Depending on his or her age and gender, each member of the household is supposed to answer (or skip) specific sections of the questionnaire. For instance, children less than 15 years of age should be asked about health, but not about employment.

- Consistency checks verify that values from one question are consistent with values from another question. A simple check occurs when both values are from the same statistical unit, for example the date of birth and age of a given individual. Furthermore, more complicated consistency checks involve comparing information from two or more different observation units. For instance, in order to check the demographic consistency of the household, consistency between the ages and genders of all household members is checked with a view to kinship relationships. Hence, parents should be at least (say) 15 years older than their children, etc.
- Checks against reference tables. In order to check the consistency of anthropometric data the recorded values for height, weight and age are checked against the World Health Organization's standard reference tables. Any value for the standard indicators (height-for-age, weight-for-age and weight-for-height) that falls beyond three standard deviations from the norm is flagged as a possible error so that the measurement can be repeated.
- Typographic errors in the inputting of monetary amounts are checked against page and column control totals in many of the modules especially in modules 11, 12 and 14.¹⁰

2. Central monitoring of data quality indicators (DQIs)

Central monitoring of data quality indicators was implemented on a continuous basis by the survey central team at headquarters over the data received from the field. On top of the computer quality checks, which focus on each specific interview, it is also necessary to monitor the overall work being done by all the interviewers together. To this purpose, the whole package of information received from the field was processed centrally and the quality of the work being done was permanently assessed by comparing the data from all the interviewers¹¹. The survey central team continuously analyzed a set of over 30 quality indicators on an interviewer basis and decided whether special supervision was needed on any particular interviewer whose work appeared to be inadequate, or whether new and more precise instructions should be issued. Thus, the monitoring of the indictors provided early warnings and the necessary corrective actions could be carried out promptly. As an example, three indicators and their trend over the 24 fortnights are described below:


Average number of persons 15+ per household who ever took vocational or technical training (overall and by interviewer). Some interviewers may undercount the number of persons who received vocational training in order to reduce their work burden, since every person who received such training should be asked a set of specific questions that should be skipped for those who did not receive it. In some surveys this behavior usually tends to intensify as fieldwork unfolds and, hence,

¹⁰ The control of typographic errors is fundamental in surveys that report amounts, and the main reason for <u>not</u> resorting to paperless interviewing (CAPI) techniques in the case of the SSLC. Decades of experience with similar surveys have shown that, in the absence of such checks, the incidence of those errors becomes unacceptable. The SSLC reports hundreds of monetary amounts for each household, and dozens of them would have been wrong. Checking the inputted amounts against control totals is a very effective way of detecting and correcting typographic errors, but this can only be done if the figures (and the control totals) are first recorded on paper, and then entered. CAPI techniques may be valuable for other kinds of surveys, but not yet for living standards or household budget surveys.

¹¹ The comparison among interviewers was facilitated by the random allocation of PSUs among interviewers each fortnight and the location of the surveyed PSUs (urban or rural) was accounted for when assessing the interviewer's performance.

the recorded number of persons with vocational training may decrease over time. The SSLC monitored this indicator to avoid such behavior, which would have a direct impact on the related estimates. The following chart displays the evolution of the average number of persons aged 15 years or more per household who ever received vocational or technical training, by interviewer and fortnight.

Average number of transactions per household recorded in the Consumption and Expenses module (overall and by interviewer). Some interviewers may undercount the expenditures on food and non-food items in order to reduce the work burden when asking about the quantity purchased and the amount spent for each product. In other surveys this behavior also tends to strengthen as fieldwork moves forward and the number of recorded transactions tend to decrease over time. The following two charts show the evolution of the household average number of food and non-food items recorded by the SSLC.

3. On-site fieldwork supervision through double-blind check-up visits

On-site fieldwork supervision via check-up interviews is an essential duty of the supervisors that can be neither fulfilled by a computer nor through the visual scrutiny of the questionnaire. It consists in verifying that interviewers have applied the different modules to the adequate respondents and that they have recorded the answers properly. This was achieved by having the supervisors re-visit a subsample of the interviewed households and re-asking some of the questions. The households to be re-visited were randomly selected, with a focus on certain interviewers based on the results obtained from the central monitoring of the quality indicators. Thus, this procedure helped maintain high standards among the interviewers and flag any unsatisfactory performance. A preference was given to those questions that had greater incentives to be answered in a particular way. For example, the interviewer may record an answer deliberately wrong in order to skip other questions and thus shorten the interview. This is the case of questions like the one that asks whether there are any former household members who have been living abroad for six months or longer; if the recorded answer is "Yes" then a whole set of questions will have to be asked about these former household members, but if the recorded answer is "No", those questions should be skipped. Thus, this kind of questions may produce incentives that can lead the interviewer to record a different answer from the one actually given by the respondent.

Finally, the annexes that follow present a guide to the computation of estimates and sampling errors, the SSLC questionnaire, a codebook with the structure and contents of the SSLC datasets and the list of special codes used by the survey.

Annex 1

Stata syntax for weighted estimates and sampling error computation

This annex provides a set of examples of the STATA syntax for computing estimates and the corresponding sampling errors, which account for the full SSLC complex sample features (stratification, clustering and weighting due to differential inclusion probabilities and nonresponse adjustments). For more details, data users are referred to the online STATA manual for the svy command (http://www.stata.com/manuals14/svy.pdf).

To specify the BSLC sample design features in any of the dataset files, use the command:

Annex 3

SSLC codebook

This annex presents the contents of the 11 files that constitute the SSLC database, with the name, the label and the kind of values contained in each variable.

The names of most variables are simple variations of their question codes on the questionnaire (e.g., variable $q13_01$, labeled "Type of dwelling", in the database file RT001, contains the answers to question 13.01, "What type of dwelling is this", in Module 13.)

Column "Values" contain the encoding used for categorical variables, or a reference to the special codes reproduced in *Annex 4*. For numerical variables, the column contains the range of acceptable values considered by the data entry program. The conventional caption "Dummy" flags the variables where the interviewer was instructed to eventually check a box on the questionnaire; these variables contain a "1" if the box was checked \square , or a blank if it was not checked \square .

The codebook below contains all of the variables in the "Restricted" version of the data files. Certain variables are excluded from the "Public" version.
