In specific terms, and focused on Suriname and Trinidad & Tobago, and Suriname, our examination of the available census data shows the following. We want to emphasize, that the national sample size numbers are not final, but very good guesses. We would want to have the IDB help us work with the national census bureaus to obtain the most recent data (e.g., definitive census data as opposed to preliminary estimates) and adjust our numbers accordingly. But we do not expect these numbers for the national samples will vary much from the final samples, and we will able to guarantee the 3,000 for the capital city areas.

Trinidad & Tobago:

Port of Spain is the capital of what is in effect a linear metropolitan area that runs from the west coast of the Island along a narrow strip of land along the Churchill Roosevelt Highway (running West to East) and the Uriah Butler Highway (running North to South). This is one, geographically contiguous metropolitan area. These areas consist of the following Municipality/Parish/Borough census units:

- 1. City of Port of Spain
- 2. San Juan/Laventille
- 3. Borogh of Arima
- 4. Borough of Chaguanas

According to the 2011 census, these also include the most densely populated areas in the country, as shown in the table below. The only real exception is the City of San Fernando, which lies south of this metro area and not part of the larger urban agglomeration.

Therefore, we define this area as "greater metropolitan Port of Spain" The total population, as can be calculated from the table above is 311,454, or 24.7% of the country.

¹ Our definitive calculations will be based on the voting-age population, but the proportions should remain nearly constant.

Therefore, we propose drawing a sample of 3,000 from this area, and drawing a remaining "national" sample of 1,130 cases.

<u>Suriname</u>

The capital is Paramaribo, with a 2011 population census of 236,065. This city alone represents 44% of the population of the country (534,189), as shown in our LAPOP table below.

The other major geographic concentrations are too far distant from the capital to be considered a continuous metro area. Therefore we would conduct 3,000 interviews in Paramaribo and additional 840 interviews for the "national" sample.
